“TOURETTE SYNDROME & RELATED DISORDERS” PRESENTED AT THE 9TH ANNUAL SAINT BARNABAS MEDICAL CENTER SYMPOSIUM

On Saturday, October 9, 1999, the Department of Graduate Medical Education at Saint Barnabas Medical Center, in Livingston, New Jersey, held their 9th Annual Abdol H. Islami Memorial Symposium. Presented in cooperation with the Tourette Syndrome Association of New Jersey, the half day program was directed at neurologists, psychiatrists, pediatricians, primary care practitioners and other health care professionals dealing with Tourette Syndrome and related disorders. The program was presented as part of their continuing medical education efforts for physicians, with those attending earning 1 credit towards the AMA Physician's Recognition Award.

The Symposium presented a distinguished panel of speakers on a wide range of topics relating to this disorder. Addressing the nearly 200 people in attendance were:

GENE STUDY ON CAUSES OF TOURETTE SYNDROME UNDERWAY

Drs. Cathy Budman, Ruth D. Bruun and Madelyn Olson of the North Shore University Hospital in New York are joining forces with doctors from the University of California to try to identify the gene or genes responsible for causing Tourette Syndrome. With funding from the National Institute of Health, they hope to learn more about how disorders such as TS may occur more commonly in some families than others.

Previous studies to identify the gene for TS have looked at groups from genetically diverse backgrounds, without success. In order to evaluate people who are more likely to share common genes, the doctors are focusing their research on a population of Ashkenazy Jews with TS. In the past, a homogeneous sample has been helpful for finding genes associated with other types of medical problems.

RESEARCH IN THE NEWS

MILK PROTEIN MAY PLAY A ROLE IN MENTAL DISORDERS

Reuters, April 1, 1999. Mental illnesses such as autism and schizophrenia may be linked to the improper digestive breakdown of casein, a protein found in milk and milk products, US researchers report. SOURCE: Autism 1999;3:67-83, 85-95.

NEW RITALIN ALLOWS LOWER DOSE

Reuters, March 25, 1999. A new formulation of the drug Ritalin can be used at about half the dosage of the current formulation, according to a Pennsylvania researcher. SOURCE: University of Pennsylvania researchers reporting at the American Chemical Society meeting.

MARIJUANA-LIKE AGENTS CALM DOPAMINE ACTIVITY

Reuters, March 25, 1999. Anandamide, a substance similar to the active ingredient of marijuana, appears to inhibit excess activity of the brain chemical dopamine, according to researchers. Dopamine hyperactivity has been linked to disorders such as schizophrenia and Tourette Syndrome. SOURCE: Nature Neuroscience 1999;2:303-304, 358-363.

OLD ANTI-DEPRESSANTS AS GOOD AS NEW

Associated Press (AP), March 19, 1999. New drugs such as Prozac and old standbys such as Elavil are about equally effective in treating many types of depression, although patients on the newer drugs may have slightly fewer side effects, according to a study. SOURCE: AP, March 19, 1999.

NEW THEORY SAYS GERMS BEHIND HEART DISEASE, CANCER

Reuters, February 24, 1999. Scientists have found that infections could be at the root of diseases as diverse as Alzheimer's, multiple sclerosis, rheumatoid arthritis, depressive and obsessive-compulsive disorders, schizophrenia, some cancers and heart disease. TOP DRUG COMPANIES JOIN INTERNATIONAL GENOME PROJECT

DEALING WITH YOUR INSURANCE COMPANY

Let's face it, there are two things that are quite frustrating in life: children and insurance companies. Of course, we love our children. Our insurance companies on the other hand...

In his book, *The Rainmaker*, prolific author, John Grisham wrote about a mythical insurance company which set out to intentionally frustrate every claimant.

In the novel, Grisham's health carrier established the policy of denying every claim, took steps to frustrate the insured's efforts to make claims and only paid claims once an attorney became involved. They played the odds (most successfully) that most of their insureds would simply give up and they'd make millions in unpaid, legitimate claims.

Myth or fact?

Sometimes one has to wonder. Today, just getting through an automated answering system at your health carrier can be difficult. Reaching a "real person" may be near impossible; and, challenging your carrier's determination that your claim is denied can seem just plain unrealistic.

However, with the right attitude and perseverance, you can be successful. There are certain steps you must take to preserve your rights.

First...

Document everything. Keep notes of each phone call including the name of the person with whom you spoke, and details of the conversation. Note how long it takes to get through. If you are disconnected from your carrier, make a note of it.

Second...

Read your policy. Learn the procedures your policy mandates you follow for making claims, questioning claims, and making appeals. You must follow your policy procedures before you have any right to challenge your carrier in court.

Third...

Write letters.

First, write the president of your own health carrier. Often, their intervention may culminate in the correction of an injustice. If after all effort with your carrier you get no satisfaction, write letters to others in power. Although your individual claim may not be paid, it is important for your insurance commissioner and your legislators (both at the state and national level) to know and understand the problems you are having with your insurance company.

Finally...

If you believe you have been improperly denied a claim by your insurance company, consider legal action. If you have the ability, consult an attorney. There are attorneys who specialize in health care law and they are your best resources in this regard. If you cannot afford an attorney, consider filing a small claims suit against your own carrier. They cannot ignore you once suit has been filed. Naturally the amount of your claim must merit the time and effort you will spend in this process and you should make certain your claim is not frivolous. However, the small claims court in New Jersey is there for the public to seek judicial redress and the judges that hear these matters are used to people appearing without attorneys.

In summary...

Have patience, document your efforts, follow your policy procedures, write letters and, if all else fails, consider filing suit. Bear in mind, like anything else in life, some insurance companies are better than others. However, they make money when they take in more premiums than they have to pay out in claims. Therefore, don't accept at face value that "you have a piece of the rock", that you "are in good hands" or other advertising hype. You must speak up for your own rights. Good luck.

TS RESEARCH IN PHILADELPHIA

Researchers at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia are conducting a study to identify the genes that contribute to the development of Tourette Syndrome and related disorders. The study group, directed by Drs. Dorothy Grice, Larry Brown, and Anthony Rostain of the Pediatric Neuropsychiatry Department, is looking for families in which a child has TS or a related disorder, and a sibling or parent also has TS or a related disorder. **TSANJ STATEWIDE MEETING
BRINGS MEMBERS TOGETHER**

On Sunday, April 18, 1999 approximately 90 members of the Tourette Syndrome Association of New Jersey gathered at the UMDNJ Medical School in New Brunswick for the Annual Statewide Meeting of TSA of NJ.

Moderated by Board Member Dennis Deutsch, the subject of the four hour meeting was "A Medical Update for TS Families."

Presenters included Psychologist, Dr. Adam Bloom, who discussed the psychological aspects of TS on both the individual and the family. Dr. Cathy Budman, Psychiatrist and Director of the Movement Disorder Clinic at North Shore Hospital reported on TS recent medical studies, research, medications, and rage disorder and how it relates to Tourette Syndrome.

Dr. Julie Lewerenz, Fellow in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, UMDNJ, Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, presented an overview of "Psychopharmacology and Tourette Syndrome" and Dr. Dorothy Pietrucha, Pediatric Neurologist explained the relationship between ADD/ADHD and Tourette Syndrome.

The question and answer period that followed the presentation provided valuable information to all TSANJ members in attendance. "Listening to the experts is always an important educational experience," stated TSANJ President Faith Rice. "And the questions and answers allowed everyone who participated to gain insight into issues specific to their situations. Everyone left the meeting more knowledgeable and certainly more able to better understand TS and what is being done to help those who are afflicted."

THE OBSESSIVE-COMPULSIVE FOUNDATION CONFERENCE

The Obsessive-Compulsive Foundation held its national conference in Arlington, VA on July 9-11, providing up-to-date information on research, resources, and recovery techniques concerning OCD and related spectrum disorders.

Workshops were presented for target audiences including families, support people, professionals, and consumers (which is how those with OCD refer to themselves). Workshops included Trichotillomania, Trauma, Recovery and Healing, Successful Job Interviewing for People with OCD, Empowering Parents in the Treatment of Childhood OCD, New Help for the Family, Living with Your Loved One's OCD, Panic and OCD, and the Assessment and Treatment of Body Dysmorphic Disorder.

The highlight of the conference was the keynote address, which featured Mike Wallace, William Styron, and Art Buchwald. These men discussed their personal experiences with mental illness and the stigma related to it. They stressed the importance of public awareness and understanding of OCD as the key to overcoming the stigma of mental illness.

GOVERNOR WHITMAN SIGNS MENTAL HEALTH PARITY BILL

On May 13, 1999, Governor Whitman signed into law S-86, the mental health parity bill. This bill requires that all health insurers in New Jersey extend the same coverage given to physical illnesses to all biologically based mental illness. Know your rights!

EEOC ISSUES GUIDANCE ON "REASONABLE ACCOMMODATIONS"

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission recently released policy guidance on issues of "reasonable accommodations" and "undue hardship" under the Americans with Disability Act.

It addresses ADA-related issues, including:

- The responsibility of individuals with disabilities to request reasonable accommodation and the way an employer should respond to a request.
- The circumstances under which employers may ask for documentation showing the need for reasonable accommodation.
- Reasonable accommodations for job applicants
- Reasonable accommodations to provide access to employer sponsored training programs, services and social function.
- New info on many types of reasonable accommodations, including job restructuring, unpaid leave, part time schedules, modified workplace policies and reassignment.
- The relationship between the obligation to provide leave as a reasonable accommodation under the ADA and the requirement of the Family Medical Leave Act.
- Changes that employers are not required to make to a job, such as lowering production standards or removing a primary job duty.
- Those instances in which an employer may deny a request for a reasonable accommodation, because it imposes an undue hardship.
